Implementation

- Planning and development:
 - Flexible model
- Identification of units involved:
 - Internal
 - External
- Identification of resources
 - Human Resources Language skills
 - Logistics: Own resources vs. outsourcing
- Marketing
- Final implementation: Failure or poor performance is not an optio
